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Mysuru Dasara

Mysuru Dussehra, Karnataka's largest and most prominent festival, boasts a 400-year-old tradition. During this grand celebration, the Mysore Palace is illuminated with 100,000 light bulbs each evening, creating a stunning visual spectacle. The festival's highlight is a grand parade featuring decorated elephants and guards on horseback, escorting the idol of the Mother Goddess through the city's streets. This vibrant event showcases Karnataka's rich cultural heritage, bringing the entire city to life with its elaborate and festive atmosphere, making it a truly mesmerizing experience for both locals and visitors alike.

Highlights:

- Mysore Dasara, a 400 year old tradition, is the biggest and the most prominent festival of Karnataka
- The Mysore Palace is lit up with1,00,000 light bulbs in the evenings for the entire duration of the festival

Dussehra

Dussehra marks the end of Devi Paksha, a fortnight of worshiping Shakti, the divine feminine. Highlighting this festival is the Ramlila, a captivating dramatization of the Ramayana with songs, narrations, and dialogues. Effigies of Ravana, his son, and brother, antagonists in the Ramayana, are filled with firecrackers and set ablaze in an open field at night, creating a spectacular sight. Delhi is renowned for its grand Dussehra celebrations at the Ramlila ground and other venues across the city, attracting visitors from around the world to witness this remarkable blend of devotion and dramatic tradition.

Highlights:

- It marks the end of the fortnight long celebration where people worship Shakti; the divine feminine of Hinduism
- · Ramlila, a fascinating screenplay of the epic Ramayana is a grand re-enactment of the great story.

Marwar Festival

Kullu Dussehra

The internationally famed Kullu Dussehra which is held in Kullu Valley dates back to the 17th century. The concept of local deities, or devtas, is ancient and is prevalent across the Himalayan region of India. The belief that these local deities rule over the land as owners, and take care of the people and their possessions, has led to a unique cultural system in the region. Kullu Dussehra is week-long congregation of many such local deities from the various villages of Kullu Valley. They arrive in colourful processions to pay respect to Raghunathji who is considered to be the head of all the local deities of Kullu Valley.

Highlights:

- · Kullu Dussehra begins when Dussehra festivities end everywhere else in India
- The flavour of the festivities, rituals and traditions of Kullu Dussehra gives a completely different feel

Bateshwar Fair

The ancient temple complex at Bateshwar consists of more than a hundred temples built along the banks of the River Yamuna, dedicated to the Hindu God Shiva. Bateshwar has long been celebrated for its annual fair, which is believed to have commenced over 2000 years ago. Although the origins of this historic fair are religious, it is also of great commercial importance and is renowned as the 2nd largest animal fair in the country (Sonepur in Bihar being the largest). The fair begins with cattle trading, followed by the trading of camels, horses and finally donkeys. The fair is a very real and authentic glimpse of rural India.

Highlights:

- · The second largest animal fair and the largest gathering of horses in India
- A great mix of age old commerce and religious fervour by the Yamuna River.

Tihar Festival

Chhath Puja

Devotees seek blessings for well-being and prosperity by offering water and prayers to the Sun, which is believed to remove negativity and darkness while bringing life and positivity. Pushkar Mela
